RESEARCH

Bulletin of Indonesian Economic Studies

The Bulletin of Indonesian Economic Studies (BIES) started 2021 with a Clarivate Impact Factor (IF) of 1.552 for 2020, the journal's second-highest IF on record. The Scopus CiteScoreTracker currently lists a score of 4.4 for 2021, meaning an increase from the 2020 CiteScore of 3.4 is likely. Google Scholar currently ranks the journal in the top eight of its Asian Studies and History category.

The December 2021 issue (57.3) began with a Survey of

Recent Developments on the impact of Covid-19 and social protection programs on poverty. Written by Asep Suryahadi, Ridho Al Izzati and Athia Yumna, the article found that the social protection programs had significantly mitigated the impact of Covid-19 on poverty. The annual Indonesian Politics paper was contributed by Charlotte Setijadi, and discussed the pandemic as a political opportunity for President Jokowi to push through economic reforms while justifying further democratic regression. Other articles included an Indonesia in Comparative Perspective paper that proposed a strategy for reforming Indonesian agriculture, by Keijiro Otsuka; and an article on digitalisation and the performance of micro and small enterprises in Yogyakarta, by Anna T. Falentina, Budy P. Resosudarmo, Danang Darmawan and Eny Sulistyaningrum. Book reviews were contributed by Gareth Evans (former Australian Attorney-General and minister), Günther Schulze and Susan Olivia.




Colombia, Indonesia, Sudan, and Uganda.

The Indonesianists

Two episodes of The Indonesianists were published this semester.

In Episode 2, <u>Virginia Hooker</u> was in conversation with Arianto Patunru. She talked about her experience living as a daughter of a Navy father, about her Ph.D. on Riau-Lingga islands (including a fascinating story about Raja Ali Haji), about her illustrated book for children, and her appreciation of Islamic calligraphy.

In Episode 3, <u>Anthony (Tony) Johns</u> was in conversation with Greg Fealy. Tony was a key figure in the founding of Asian studies at ANU and is one of the seminal figures in the study of Southeast Asian Islam. He spoke about his early life and academic career, and particularly about how he came to be interested in Islam and Qur'anic exegesis. At the age of 93, he is still engaged in research and publishing.
